GENERAL RULES

Theme: Birds of a Feather

Show Colors: Blue, Grey, Yellow

Eligibility: Entries may be made by members of the Black Hills District of Garden Clubs, all judges; including student judges from any district in Washington State Federation of Garden Clubs. **Advanced Entries:** Advanced entries **required** in Division I Sections F and G, Division II, Division III and Division IV, Section B. For advanced entries contact the consultant listed in each section by April 1, 2025. **Exhibitor must provide a substitute if unable to participate.** Each exhibitor is limited to one entry per class, except in the Horticulture Division and the Botanical Arts Horticulture Section. Exhibitors may make more than one entry per class if each is a different species, variety, cultivar, type or color.

Entry Time: Enter all divisions between 8:00 and 9:30 a.m., Friday, April 11, 2025, at the side door of the Sokolik Building on the Thurston County Fairgrounds. Entry/classification chairmen will check for conformity to the schedule. **Only exhibitors and the show committee are allowed in the building during this time.**

Removal Time: All entries must be removed between 2:30 p.m. and 3:00 p.m. No removal is allowed prior to 2:30 p.m.

Entry Tags: Horticulture entry tags will be available from club presidents after March 15, 2025, and on the District Website. All other tags will be completed by the show committee.

Plant Material: There must be an emphasis on FRESH plant material. Artificial plant material is not allowed in any division. Plants on the state conservation list must have been grown by the exhibitor or obtained in a legal manner and so stated. Noxious plants are not allowed in any division. See state conservation website for a complete list: www.nwcb.wa.gov.

DIVISION I – HORTICULTURE

HORTICULTURE RULES

Handbook for Flower Shows (HB), page 49

- 1. All plant material must be fresh and have been grown by the exhibitor.
- 2. All entries are to be labeled with the genus, specific epithet, variety and/or cultivar, or patented/trademarked names. Common names may also be given. Entry cards are to be filled out in advance, if possible.
- 3. Entries must be in the exhibitor's possession for at least 90 days. Exhibitors must have a combination of plantings in their possession at least six weeks and arboreal entries at least six months.
- 4. No limit to entries per exhibitor if each entry is a different cultivar, color, or type.
- 5. The Classification Committee has the authority to subdivide classes as necessary. Specimens with a class designation in the schedule may not be entered in the "Any other worthy specimen" class.
- 6. Unobtrusive wedging, provided by the exhibitor is permitted. Weights or clear decorative fillers may be used to stabilize bottles.
- 7. Entries shall be appropriate size for the species, cultivar/variety or type or as required by the schedule.
- 8. Exhibitor may provide their own clear, colorless glass container the appropriate size for the cut specimen. No foliage below the water line.
- 9. Good grooming and conditioning are important. No enhancement of foliage is permitted.
- 10. Entries accepted between 8:00 and 9:30 a.m. must be removed between 2:30 and 3:00 p.m., no earlier than 2:30 p.m.
- 11. A flowering plant should be exhibited as a flowering specimen. Foliage plants may flower but should be exhibited as foliage plants if they are grown for their leaves.
- 12. Containers for container grown plants may be a maximum of 16". Double potting is allowed, though the inside pot must be concealed.
- 13. Preregistration is required for collections and displays.

HORTICULTURE GLOSSARY

Collection: an exhibit consisting of at least five (5) different specimens, each in a separate container. Judged for cultural perfection of plant material.

Cultivar: a hybrid or sport of a species which will not come true when seeds are planted. First letter of name to be capitalized, with full name enclosed in single quotes; or "cv" may precede the name and no quotes.

Display: an exhibit of at least five (5) different specimens artistically staged by the exhibitor. Judged equally for cultural perfection and decorative effect.

Genus: (pl. genera) subgroup of Family of closely related plants. A genus is ALWAYS capitalized and italicized if printed, underlined if hand-written.

Specific Epithet: a subgroup of a genus. The second term in a binomial name. Printed or written in lower case letters and italicized or underlined.

Wedging: inserting a small piece of material, e.g. a sprig of evergreen, a bit of wood or a piece of plastic wrap, in the neck of an exhibit bottle to hold a cut specimen in its proper pose.

DIVISION II – DESIGN

Handbook for Flower Shows (HB), page 63

DESIGN RULES

- 1. Advanced entry required. Call design consultant by April 1, 2025. If unable to fulfill the assignment, the designer must find a replacement and notify the consultant.
- 2. Must be the work of one individual. Exhibitors may enter as many classes as desired, but only one exhibit per class or sub-class.
- 3. Designs must contain some plant material. Emphasis is on fresh plant material. Plant material need not be grown by designer.
- 4. Plant material used in a design must be listed on a separate card placed with the exhibit. Botanical and/or common name acceptable.
- 5. All properties provided by the show committee unless otherwise noted.
- 6. Designs may be placed between 8:30 and 9:30 a.m., and may be removed at 2:30 p.m. Designs may not be removed before 2:30 p.m.
- 7. If staging panel is used, design must be contained within it. Both Height and width.

Design Glossary:

Creative Design: uses components in a non-realistic manner and may contain abstraction, with plant material not necessarily in water. HB pg. 71

Traditional Mass Design: a Creative Design emphasizing a greater proportion of plant material and components other than space. HB pg. 71

Two Container Design: a Creative Design using two separate containers. Containers do not need to be alike; plant material must be compatible.

Exhibition Table: not meant to be functional. Created artistically to suggest the service of food with no requirements as to the type or number of table appointments. Plant material must be used as needed for the overall design.

Buffet Table: service of four (4) or more, with components conveniently and logically placed for ease of self service. At least one service piece is required.

Functional Table: planned and set for actual service of food. Convenience and a sense of order must prevail. A decorative unit (completed floral design) must be included. HB pg. 76

DIVISION II – DESIGN

Class 1. Fly Like an Eagle: Creative Design. Staged in Black free-standing frame provided by show committee measuring 72" High and 36" wide to be viewed from all sides. Can be hanging or stationary.

Class 2. **Plumage**: Traditional Mass Design. Staged on a black pedestal with 20" round top. To be viewed from all sides.

Class 3. Two Turtle Doves. Two Container Design. Staged on 30" of a 6' table, 30" deep, draped in black. Staging panel allowed.

Section B: Feed the Birds

Eligible for NGC Table Artistry Award, NGC Award of Design Excellence, WSFGC Phyllis Danielson Table Setting Award, WSFGC Ellen B. Swenson Flower Arrangement Award, WSFGC Carolyn Erickson All Fresh Design Award, WSFGC Recycling Award

Class 4. Love Birds: Functional romantic dinner for two. Staged on a card table provided by show committee to be viewed from all sides. Decorative unit required. Exhibitor to provide table covering.

Class 5. Big Birds Breakfast: Buffet table for four children for breakfast. Decorative unit required. Staged on a 6' by 30" table draped in black, exhibitor may provide additional table coverings.

Class 6. Birds of Paradise: Exhibition table for lunch in the tropics. Staged on 24" of 6' x 30" table draped in black. Staging panel allowed. Some plant material required.

DIVISION III – EDUCATION

EDUCATION RULES

- 1. Exhibit to cover a minimum of 18 square feet.
- 2. Use of some fresh plant material is recommended but not required. Artificial plant material is not allowed.
- 3. Staged on a 6' by 30" table, skirted in black, provided by the committee.
- 4. Handouts are encouraged, not required.
- 5. Educational exhibits may be the work of more than one individual or organization unless a student judge or an accredited judge is seeking exhibiting credit for preparing an educational exhibit. These are competitive exhibits.

DIVISION IV - BOTANICAL ARTS

Rules HB pg. 91

BOTANICAL ARTS

- 1. All botanical arts horticulture exhibits must contain some plant material. No artificial plant material is allowed in any exhibit.
- 2. Entry cards must be completed with the genus, specific epithet and/or variety. Common names may be added.
- 3. The scale of points for judging Botanical Arts Horticulture, Artistic Crafts and Photography are listed in Chapter 14 of The Handbook for Flower Shows. HB pg. 129
- 4. The rules for Botanical Arts Horticulture, Botanical Artistic Crafts and Photography are printed in Chapter 10 of The Handbook for Flower Shows. HB pg. 91
- 5. Staged on an 8' by 30" table, skirted in black, provided by the committee.

BOTANICAL ARTS GLOSSARY

Artistic Craft: objects with a function. They may be artistically pleasing but were not created solely for their artistic value. They serve a purpose and can be labeled as a certain object such as basket, necklace, package or hat.

Genus: (pl. genera) subgroup of Family of closely related plants. A genus is ALWAYS capitalized and italicized if printed, underlined if hand-written.

Specific Epithet: a subgroup of a genus. The second term in a binomial name. Printed or written in lower case letters and italicized or underlined.

Section 1: Bird Habitat

Horticulture

Eligible for NGC Botanical Arts Horticulture Award

Class 1. Branches: Large branches showing form, or textural interest – minimum length of 30", maximum of 48", judged by Horticulture Scale of Points.

Class 2. Fairy Garden: Maximum of 24" May contain accessories.

Botanical Arts Artistic Crafts Rules

- 1. Exhibits use plant material to combine horticulture, design, and craft work.
- 2. Exhibit must contain some fresh and/or dried plant material. Only dried material may be treated.
- 3. Must include a card listing all plant material used in the craft.
- 4. Artistic crafts are objects with a function.
- 5. Must preregister.

Class 1. Decorated Birdhouse: Functional, decorated bird house. Maximum of 18" height or width. Displayed on 22" of 8' table, draped in black.

Class 2. Bird Bath: Decorated bowl, provided by the exhibitor, no larger than 20" in diameter. Displayed on 24" of an 8' x 30" table, draped in black.

Class 3. Bird Feeder: Decorated feeder to be made from a 2-liter soda bottle, provided by exhibitor. Displayed on 18" of a 6' x 30" table.
